When they were considering how to make a significant gift to Saint Meinrad, they decided to make Saint Meinrad the beneficiary of a life insurance policy.

Cheryl describes how it works: You take out insurance – say \$100,000 – and make Saint Meinrad the owner of the policy. Bill and Cheryl are the insured. "We then give money to Saint Meinrad to pay the premium," she explains. "By doing it that way, we get to write off the cost of the premium on our taxes."

"When either one of us passes away, a large chunk of money is going to go to Saint Meinrad," she says. "And when I say 'large chunk,' I mean compared to what the premiums are. It's a way to really expand your gift."


Bill and Cheryl also take advantage of the fact that her company will match their gift, allowing them to make their donation twice as valuable.

Lessons for Giving Wisely

Cheryl and Bill Halik give to a variety of charitable causes. Here are some lessons they've learned about making gifts wisely.

- 1. **Take advantage of matching gift funds.** Cheryl's company offers to match gifts made to charities, up to \$3,000 annually. "You need to do at least what they match," she says. "It's free money."
- 2. **Look at tax benefits.** Often, gifts to Saint Meinrad are eligible for tax benefits. Any tax savings may make your gift budget stretch further.
- 3. Choose a giving vehicle that works for you. Cheryl and Bill like the idea of using an insurance policy as a gift. When the policy matures, the proceeds will be a gift that is much larger than they could otherwise make.
- 4. **Find someone to help you.** Since Cheryl is an insurance agent, she is familiar with how insurance works. If you're interested in using an insurance policy as a gift, find an insurance company with a strong financial rating and a good agent who can guide you through the process.

Life insurance policy can become charitable gift

Did you know that you might have a sizeable financial asset sitting unnoticed in your file cabinet?

Many of us buy life insurance to help with various expenses in case we don't live as long as we had hoped. Fortunately, many of us outlive our worst-case scenario.

The typical result is that our insurance policy is in force (maybe even paid up) and growing in value, even as our life is lengthening. In the meantime, other assets are growing to the point where the protection we sought is no longer necessary.

The insurance policy becomes a "hidden" asset, evidenced only by a file folder that we add to when the annual statement arrives. The value of the policy seems to be essentially frozen, even dormant. If it has little

benefit to you today, is there a better use for such a policy?

That nearly forgotten policy could be a way to significantly support Saint Meinrad. It could become a gift to support the monastery, the Seminary and School of Theology, or even a capital project that is important to you. After all, this is an asset that you have held for some time, and it can have an impact that reflects its history.


If you are still paying premiums on an older policy or have insurance you might like to contribute, explore how it might work as a gift to Saint Meinrad.
